LECTIO DIVINA: ENCOUNTERING GOD IN SCRIPTURE

"Lectio Divina, a Latin phrase translated divine or sacred reading, is an approach to Scripture that opens us to a life-transforming encounter with God with the biblical text. It refers to an ancient practice of the early mothers and fathers of the Christian faith, and it is a slower and more reflective reading of the Scriptures that allows God to address us directly, according to what He knows we need." ~Ruth Haley Barton, Sacred Rhythms

When we engage the scriptures, we engage our:

- mind
- heart
- emotions
- body
- curiosity
- imagination
- will

We will read the scripture several times slowly and read it as a love letter, not for information only, but for transformation. Anticipate what God will say to you. Express your willingness to hear from the Lord.

<u>READ</u> (Lectio): Read the passage slowly. Listen for the word or phrase addressed to you personally and circle it/mark it.

<u>REFLECT (Meditatio)</u>: Read the passage again slowly. What's going on in this passage? Listen for how the passage connects with your life. What is it in your life right now that needs to hear this word? Where are you in this scene? How does your life experience connect with this story?

<u>RESPOND (Oratio)</u>: Again, read the passage slowly. What is your response to God based upon what you have read and encountered? Enter into a personal dialogue with God and share your feelings of love, joy, sorrow, repentance, desire, need, etc.

<u>REST (Contemplatio)</u>: After this final reading, return to a place of resting and waiting on God, listening to His still, small voice. Listen for the phrase, "I am your ______." Then write down what you feel God was/is saying to you. This is a posture of abandonment to the Lover of your soul, like a weaned child leaning against his mother. (Psalm 131:2)

<u>RESOLVE:</u> Today's reminder (I resolve to ... _____).
